
Manual Accuracy

AWARNING

SECTION 1: SAFETY

For Your Own Safety, Read Instruction Manual Before Operating This Machine

The purpose of safety symbols is to attract your attention to possible hazardous conditions. This manual uses a series of symbols and signal words intended to convey the level of importance of the safety messages. The progression of symbols is described below. Remember that safety messages by themselves do not eliminate danger and are not a substitute for proper accident prevention measures. Always use common sense and good judgment.



Indicates an imminently hazardous situation which, if not avoided, WILL result in death or serious injury.

AWARNING

Indicates a potentially hazardous situation which, if not avoided, COULD result in death or serious injury.

ACAUTION

Indicates a potentially hazardous situation which, if not avoided, MAY result in minor or moderate injury. It may also be used to alert against unsafe practices.

NOTICE

Alerts the user to useful information about proper operation of the machine to avoid machine damage.

Safety Instructions for Machinery

AWARNING

OWNER'S MANUAL. Read and understand this owner's manual BEFORE using machine.

TRAINED OPERATORS ONLY. Untrained operators have a higher risk of being hurt or killed. Only allow trained/supervised people to use this machine. When machine is not being used, disconnect power, remove switch keys, or lock-out machine to prevent unauthorized use—especially around children. Make your workshop kid proof!

DANGEROUS ENVIRONMENTS. Do not use machinery in areas that are wet, cluttered, or have poor lighting. Operating machinery in these areas greatly increases the risk of accidents and injury.

MENTAL ALERTNESS REQUIRED. Full mental alertness is required for safe operation of machinery. Never operate under the influence of drugs or alcohol, when tired, or when distracted.

ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT INJURY RISKS.

You can be shocked, burned, or killed by touching live electrical components or improperly grounded machinery. To reduce this risk, only allow qualified service personnel to do electrical installation or repair work, and always disconnect power before accessing or exposing electrical equipment.

DISCONNECT POWER FIRST. Always disconnect machine from power supply BEFORE making adjustments, changing tooling, or servicing machine. This prevents an injury risk from unintended startup or contact with live electrical components.

EYE PROTECTION. Always wear ANSI-approved safety glasses or a face shield when operating or observing machinery to reduce the risk of eye injury or blindness from flying particles. Everyday eyeglasses are NOT approved safety glasses.



AWARNING

WEARING PROPER APPAREL. Do not wear clothing, apparel or jewelry that can become entangled in moving parts. Always tie back or cover long hair. Wear non-slip footwear to reduce risk of slipping and losing control or accidentally contacting cutting tool or moving parts.

HAZARDOUS DUST. Dust created by machinery operations may cause cancer, birth defects, or long-term respiratory damage. Be aware of dust hazards associated with each workpiece material. Always wear a NIOSH-approved respirator to reduce your risk.

HEARING PROTECTION. Always wear hearing protection when operating or observing loud machinery. Extended exposure to this noise without hearing protection can cause permanent hearing loss.

REMOVE ADJUSTING TOOLS. Tools left on machinery can become dangerous projectiles upon startup. Never leave chuck keys, wrenches, or any other tools on machine. Always verify removal before starting!

USE CORRECT TOOL FOR THE JOB. Only use this tool for its intended purpose—do not force it or an attachment to do a job for which it was not designed. Never make unapproved modifications—modifying tool or using it differently than intended may result in malfunction or mechanical failure that can lead to personal injury or death!

AWKWARD POSITIONS. Keep proper footing and balance at all times when operating machine. Do not overreach! Avoid awkward hand positions that make workpiece control difficult or increase the risk of accidental injury.

CHILDREN & BYSTANDERS. Keep children and bystanders at a safe distance from the work area. Stop using machine if they become a distraction.

GUARDS & COVERS. Guards and covers reduce accidental contact with moving parts or flying debris. Make sure they are properly installed, undamaged, and working correctly BEFORE operating machine.

FORCING MACHINERY. Do not force machine. It will do the job safer and better at the rate for which it was designed.

NEVER STAND ON MACHINE. Serious injury may occur if machine is tipped or if the cutting tool is unintentionally contacted.

STABLE MACHINE. Unexpected movement during operation greatly increases risk of injury or loss of control. Before starting, verify machine is stable and mobile base (if used) is locked.

USE RECOMMENDED ACCESSORIES. Consult this owner's manual or the manufacturer for recommended accessories. Using improper accessories will increase the risk of serious injury.

UNATTENDED OPERATION. To reduce the risk of accidental injury, turn machine *OFF* and ensure all moving parts completely stop before walking away. Never leave machine running while unattended.

MAINTAIN WITH CARE. Follow all maintenance instructions and lubrication schedules to keep machine in good working condition. A machine that is improperly maintained could malfunction, leading to serious personal injury or death.

DAMAGED PARTS. Regularly inspect machine for damaged, loose, or mis-adjusted parts—or any condition that could affect safe operation. Immediately repair/replace BEFORE operating machine. For your own safety, DO NOT operate machine with damaged parts!

MAINTAIN POWER CORDS. When disconnecting cord-connected machines from power, grab and pull the plug—NOT the cord. Pulling the cord may damage the wires inside. Do not handle cord/plug with wet hands. Avoid cord damage by keeping it away from heated surfaces, high traffic areas, harsh chemicals, and wet/damp locations.

EXPERIENCING DIFFICULTIES. If at any time you experience difficulties performing the intended operation, stop using the machine! Contact our Technical Support at (570) 546-9663.



Additional Safety for Buffers

AWARNING

Serious injury or death can occur from impact injuries. Rotating buffing wheels can easily remove skin, or entanglement/amputation injuries can occur from being caught in moving parts or in-running pinch points. To minimize risk of getting hurt or killed, anyone operating machine MUST completely heed hazards and warnings below.

HAND/WHEEL CONTACT. Never purposely touch the moving buffing wheel or shaft. Take care to keep fingers away from buffing wheel during operations. If the workpiece is small or difficult to hold, use a workpiece holding fixture. Abrasive accessories can quickly remove large amounts of skin!

AVOID WORKPIECE GRAB. Firmly support the workpiece against the rotation direction of the buffing wheel. Otherwise, the buffing wheel could grab the workpiece and pull your hands into the moving wheel.

AVOID KICKBACK. Avoid kickback by buffing in accordance with directional arrows. Always buff on the downward side of the wheel—pay close attention to the direction of wheel rotation to avoid placing the workpiece against the upward side of the buffing wheel. Avoid buffing with excessive force.

WORKPIECE SELECTION. Always inspect the condition of your workpiece. DO NOT buff pieces with loose knots, large splinters, sharp edges, and DO NOT buff knives, cable, chain or other potentially dangerous objects that may be grabbed by the buffing wheel and thrown at the operator.

WORKPIECE FEED. Allow the wheel to reach full speed, then slowly ease the workpiece into the buffing wheel, holding it in front of and slightly below the wheel center. Do not place the workpiece on the top or sides of the buffing wheel and do not place an edge or corner of the workpiece against the buffing wheel, or jam it against the wheel. The workpiece may eject toward the operator or be torn from the operator's hands, causing serious personal injury.

WORKPIECE CONTROL. If you cannot hold small workpieces securely, do not buff them with this machine. Secure them with clamps or similar jigs or use a smaller buffer.

DISCONNECT POWER WHEN SERVICING.

Disconnect the machine from power and allow the wheel to come to a complete stop before service, maintenance, or adjustments. Avoid pulling cord-connected machinery from the cord instead, grasp the plug when disconnecting it from power.

AVOID ENTANGLEMENT. Tie back long hair and remove any loose-fitting clothing or jewelry that could be caught up in the buffing wheel or other moving machine parts. Avoid wearing gloves as they may get caught in the buffing wheel and cause entanglement injuries.

MOUNTING TO BENCH/STAND. An unsecured buffer may become dangerously out of control during operation. Make sure buffer is FIRMLY secured to a bench/stand before use.

CORRECT ACCESSORIES AND USE. Never install a grinding wheel on this buffer. It is only designed for buffing and polishing. Never exceed the maximum speed listed on each buffing/polishing wheel.

OPERATOR POSITION. Do not stand directly in front of the buffer wheel when turning the machine on, or when buffing. Do not buff material at the rear of the machine.

BE AWARE OF DUST ALLERGIES. Be aware that certain woods may cause an allergic reaction in people and animals, especially when fine dust is created by buffing. Make sure you know what type of wood dust you will be exposed to in case there is a possibility of an allergic reaction.



SECTION 2: POWER SUPPLY

Availability

Before installing the machine, consider the availability and proximity of the required power supply circuit. If an existing circuit does not meet the requirements for this machine, a new circuit must be installed. To minimize the risk of electrocution, fire, or equipment damage, installation work and electrical wiring must be done by an electrician or qualified service personnel in accordance with all applicable codes and standards.



AWARNING

Electrocution, fire, shock, or equipment damage may occur if machine is not properly grounded and connected to power supply.

Full-Load Current Rating

The full-load current rating is the amperage a machine draws at 100% of the rated output power. On machines with multiple motors, this is the amperage drawn by the largest motor or sum of all motors and electrical devices that might operate at one time during normal operations.

Full-Load Current Rating at 115V...... 14 Amps

The full-load current is not the maximum amount of amps that the machine will draw. If the machine is overloaded, it will draw additional amps beyond the full-load rating.

If the machine is overloaded for a sufficient length of time, damage, overheating, or fire may result—especially if connected to an undersized circuit. To reduce the risk of these hazards, avoid overloading the machine during operation and make sure it is connected to a power supply circuit that meets the specified circuit requirements.

AWARNING

Serious injury could occur if you connect machine to power before completing setup process. DO NOT connect to power until instructed later in this manual.

115V Circuit Requirements

This machine is prewired to operate on a power supply circuit that has a verified ground and meets the following requirements:

Nominal Voltage	110V–120V
Cycle	60 Hz
Phase	Single-Phase
Power Supply Circuit	15 Amps

A power supply circuit includes all electrical equipment between the breaker box or fuse panel in the building and the machine. The power supply circuit used for this machine must be sized to safely handle the full-load current drawn from the machine for an extended period of time. (If this machine is connected to a circuit protected by fuses, use a time delay fuse marked D.)

ACAUTION

For your own safety and protection of property, consult an electrician if you are unsure about wiring practices or electrical codes in your area.

Note: Circuit requirements in this manual apply to a dedicated circuit—where only one machine will be running on the circuit at a time. If machine will be connected to a shared circuit where multiple machines may be running at the same time, consult an electrician or qualified service personnel to ensure circuit is properly sized for safe operation.



Grounding & Plug Requirements

This machine MUST be grounded. In the event of certain malfunctions or breakdowns, grounding reduces the risk of electric shock by providing a path of least resistance for electric current.

This machine is equipped with a power cord that has an equipment-grounding wire and a grounding plug. Only insert plug into a matching receptacle (outlet) that is properly installed and grounded in accordance with all local codes and ordinances. DO NOT modify the provided plug!





Figure 1. Typical 5-15 plug and receptacle.



SHOCK HAZARD!

Two-prong outlets do not meet the grounding requirements for this machine. Do not modify or use an adapter on the plug provided—if it will not fit the outlet, have a qualified electrician install the proper outlet with a verified ground.

Improper connection of the equipment-grounding wire can result in a risk of electric shock. The wire with green insulation (with or without yellow stripes) is the equipment-grounding wire. If repair or replacement of the power cord or plug is necessary, do not connect the equipment-grounding wire to a live (current carrying) terminal.

Check with a qualified electrician or service personnel if you do not understand these grounding requirements, or if you are in doubt about whether the tool is properly grounded. If you ever notice that a cord or plug is damaged or worn, disconnect it from power, and immediately replace it with a new one.

Extension Cords

We do not recommend using an extension cord with this machine. If you must use an extension cord, only use it if absolutely necessary and only on a temporary basis.

Extension cords cause voltage drop, which can damage electrical components and shorten motor life. Voltage drop increases as the extension cord size gets longer and the gauge size gets smaller (higher gauge numbers indicate smaller sizes).

Any extension cord used with this machine must be in good condition and contain a ground wire and matching plug/receptacle. Additionally, it must meet the following size requirements:

Minimum Gauge Size14 AWG Maximum Length (Shorter is Better)......50 ft.



SECTION 3: SETUP

Unpacking

This machine was carefully packaged for safe transport. When unpacking, separate all enclosed items from packaging materials and inspect them for shipping damage. *If items are damaged, please call us immediately at (570) 546-9663.*

IMPORTANT: Save all packaging materials until you are completely satisfied with the machine and have resolved any issues between Grizzly or the shipping agent. You MUST have the original packaging to file a freight claim. It is also extremely helpful if you need to return your machine later.



AWARNING

SUFFOCATION HAZARD! Keep children and pets away from plastic bags or packing materials shipped with this machine.

Inventory

The following is a list of items shipped with your machine. Before beginning setup, lay these items out and inventory them.

If any non-proprietary parts are missing (e.g. a nut or a washer), we will gladly replace them; or for the sake of expediency, replacements can be obtained at your local hardware store.

NOTICE

If you cannot find an item on this list, carefully check around/inside the machine and packaging materials. Often, these items get lost in packaging materials while unpacking or they are pre-installed at the factory.




Figure 2. Buffing system inventory.

Cleanup

The shafts of your machine are coated with a heavy-duty rust preventative that prevents corrosion during shipment and storage. This rust preventative works extremely well, but it will take a little time to clean.

Be patient and do a thorough job cleaning your machine. The time you spend doing this now will give you a better appreciation for the proper care of your machine's unpainted surfaces.

There are many ways to remove this rust preventative, but the following steps work well in a wide variety of situations. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions with any cleaning product you use and make sure you work in a well-ventilated area to minimize exposure to toxic fumes.

Before cleaning, gather the following:

- Disposable Rags
- Cleaner/degreaser (WD•40 works well)
- Safety glasses & disposable gloves
- Plastic paint scraper (optional)

Basic steps for removing rust preventative:

- 1. Put on safety glasses.
- Coat the rust preventative with a liberal amount of cleaner/degreaser, then let it soak for 5–10 minutes.
- **3.** Wipe off the surfaces. If your cleaner/ degreaser is effective, the rust preventative will wipe off easily. If you have a plastic paint scraper, scrape off as much as you can first, then wipe off the rest with the rag.
- **4.** Repeat **Steps 2–3** as necessary until clean, then coat all unpainted surfaces with a quality metal protectant to prevent rust.

NOTICE

Avoid chlorine-based solvents, such as acetone or brake parts cleaner, that may damage painted surfaces.

Site Considerations

Workbench Load

Refer to the **Machine Data Sheet** for the weight and footprint specifications of your machine. Some workbenches may require additional reinforcement to support both the machine and materials.

Placement Location





Figure 3. Minimum working clearances.

Consider existing and anticipated needs, size of material to be processed through each machine, and space for auxiliary stands, work tables or other machinery when establishing a location for your new machine. See **Figure 3** for the minimum working clearances.

Bench Mounting

The base of this machine has mounting holes that allow it to be fastened to a workbench or other mounting surface to prevent it from moving during operation and causing accidental injury or damage.

The strongest mounting option is a "Through Mount" (see example below) where holes are drilled all the way through the workbench—and hex bolts, washers, and hex nuts are used to secure the machine in place.




Figure 4. Example of a "Through Mount" setup.

Another option is a "direct mount" (see example below) where the machine is secured directly to the workbench with lag screws and washers.




Figure 5. Example of a "Direct Mount" setup.

Test Run

Once assembly is complete, test run the machine to ensure it is properly connected to power and safety components are functioning correctly.

If you find an unusual problem during the test run, immediately stop the machine, disconnect it from power, and fix the problem BEFORE operating the machine again. The **Troubleshooting** table in the **SERVICE** section of this manual can help.

AWARNING

Serious injury or death can result from using this machine BEFORE understanding its controls and related safety information. DO NOT operate, or allow others to operate, machine until the information is understood.

AWARNING


DO NOT start machine until all preceding setup instructions have been performed. Operating an improperly set up machine may result in malfunction or unexpected results that can lead to serious injury, death, or machine/property damage.

To test run machine:

- **1.** Clear all setup tools away from machine.
- 2. Connect machine to power supply.
- Turn machine *ON*. Verify motor operation, and then turn machine *OFF*.

The motor should run smoothly and without unusual problems or noises.

SECTION 4: OPERATIONS



AWARNING


To reduce your risk of serious injury, read this entire manual BEFORE using machine.

AWARNING

To reduce risk of eye injury from flying chips or lung damage from breathing dust, always wear safety glasses and a respirator when operating this machine.







AWARNING

Keep hair, clothing, and jewelry away from moving parts at all times. Entanglement can result in death, amputation, or severe crushing injuries!

NOTICE

If you are not experienced with this type of machine, WE STRONGLY RECOMMEND that you seek additional training outside of this manual. Read books/magazines or get formal training before beginning any projects. Regardless of the content in this section, Grizzly Industrial will not be held liable for accidents caused by lack of training.

Buffing and Polishing Setup

The Model G1061/G1061Z Buffing System is strictly designed for buffing and polishing operations. IT IS NOT A GRINDER. The absence of grinding wheel guards and eye shields prohibits the use of this machine as a grinder.

Note: Use caution when polishing plated metals; there is a chance that the thin plated material may be damaged. A light pressure is all that is needed for quality work.

To install wheel and buff or polish:

- DISCONNECT MACHINE FROM POWER!
- 2. Using (2) ¹⁵/₁₆" wrenches, remove the hex nuts at the end of each shaft, then remove provided wheel flanges from each shaft.

Note: When facing the machine, the shaft on the left side has left-handed threads, meaning the nut loosens when turned clockwise. The shaft on the right side has right-handed threads, meaning the nut loosens when turned counterclockwise.




Figure 6. Buffing wheels installed.

3. Fit (1) ¾" x ¾" x ¾" x ¾6" T-bushing inside (1) 1" x ¾" x ¾6" T-bushing and slide onto first shaft. Insert a buffing wheel (not included) between each of the two wheel flanges, then slide flanges onto shaft and secure with hex nut removed in Step 2, as shown in Figure 6. Repeat on second shaft.

- Select the appropriate stick of polishing compound for your application, and apply to the rotating face of the wheel.
- **5**. Put on safety glasses and a respirator, then connect machine to power.

ACAUTION

Never buff with workpiece on top of the wheel. Workpiece may catch on wheel and be thrown at operator. Always buff workpiece near the bottom of the wheel!

- **6.** Stand to the side of the buffer and turn it *ON*.
- 7. Allow the buffer to reach full speed.
- Firmly grasp the workpiece with both hands. Lightly and evenly move the workpiece back and forth on the buffing wheel.

Buffing Tips

Below are some quick tips for getting the most out of your buffer. Remember, there is no substitute for experience. Learning how to hold the workpiece, how much pressure to apply, how to move the workpiece against the wheel, and how much compound to use requires some amount of trial-and-error.

- Thoroughly clean all parts that you plan to buff. Dirt, oil, rust, paint or other film must be removed chemically or with water. Make sure to dry off parts with a rag after cleaning.
- Apply buffing compounds in small amounts at a time. Apply paste-type compounds with a wand or directly to the part. For wax-based polishing stick-type compounds, press the compound on the wheel for a couple of seconds while the machine is running. Avoid using too much compound.
- Put your workpiece under the wheel when you are loading the compound on the buffing wheel. This way, you will catch any compound that would normally be wasted on the floor.




Figure 7. Location where workpiece should contact wheel.

- Only use the area indicated in Figure 7 to do the actual buffing. Contacting the workpiece on areas outside the correct area may flip the workpiece out of your hands.

- Hold the workpiece tightly at all times while buffing. Placing one hand near the contact point will give you better control.
- Keep buffing wheels raked out before each use and when buildup gets heavy during use.
 Raking means to clean the buffing wheels with a wheel rake to remove built-up compounds and metal particles. ALWAYS use light pressure when raking wheels!
- Do not mix two different compounds on the same wheel. For best results, use a separate wheel for each compound.




Figure 8. Cutting and polishing strokes.

- Always use an upward stroke with heavy to moderate pressure for cutting. Use a downward stroke with light pressure for polishing. See Figure 8.

 Wear safety equipment when buffing. If the buffer forces the workpiece out of your hand, be prepared for it to come flying at you! Wear safety glasses or a face shield and a heavy leather apron. Also, wear a dust mask to protect your lungs from microscopic particulate that will be flying off the wheel.

Buffing Compound Selection

Most colors of abrasives have similar applications, but always check with the manufacturer of your particular compound.

Grizzly offers the following buffing compounds:

Red Rouge — Made for fine polishing on brass and gold. Provides an excellent shine when used with the loose muslin buffing wheel.

Green (Extra Fine) — Great for extra-fine polishing on most metals to bring out that mirror finish. Works best with loose muslin and spiral-sewn buffing wheels.

Green (Fine) — Slightly more abrasive than the extra fine green, this green compound is great for a medium to fine polish with most softer metals.

White — Great for ivory, plastic and resins when used successively with the soft spiral-sewn and soft airway buffing wheels.

Black — Designed to be used with sisal and airway hard buffing wheels, this compound is perfect for the initial rough cut on stainless steel and iron.

Tripoli — A true middle-of-the-road abrasive, Tripoli provides an excellent medium cut for brass, aluminum and zinc alloy.

Buffing Wheel Selection

Buffing wheels are available for most types of metals and for different stages in the buffing process. Below are pictures and descriptions of common wheel types:

Loose Muslin

Soft feather-edged muslin stitched together near the center leaves the outer edge to provide a wide angle, fine polishing surface. Perfect for polishing stainless steel, chrome, gold or silver.



Airway Hard

Made of 100% cotton sheets that are treated to stiffen the material. Pleats in the material help hold compound. These are great for rough cutting plastics and initial polishing a wide variety of metals.



Airway Soft

Made of 100% cotton sheets and held together with a steel retainer. Pleats in the material help hold compound. These wheels are great for polishing soft metals and plastics.



Laminated Sisal

Designed for rough cutting, sisal works well with various steels, copper, aluminum, and brass to remove scratches and prepare the piece for polishing.



Spiral Sewn

Consist of layers of 100% unbleached cotton sheeting that are spiral sewn ½" apart. Works well for initial polish on brass, stainless steel, aluminum, bronze and cast iron.

Loading Compound on Wheels

Select a buffing compound and buffing wheel that is suitable for the workpiece and each sequence of the buffing or polishing operation. Refer to **Buffing Compound Selection** on **Page 14** and **Buffing Wheel Selection** on **Page 15** before loading compound on the buffing wheel.

To load compound on wheels:

- Select buffing wheel suitable for workpiece (refer to Buffing Wheel Selection and Buffing Wheel Sequence Key on Page 15).
 Follow directions on Page 12 to install wheel.
- 2. Select buffing compound suitable to material (refer to **Buffing Compound Selection** and **Buffing Compound Sequence Key** on **Page 14**).

Note: Make sure buffing wheel is free of any compound used in prior buffing operation. Clean with a buffing wheel rake if necessary (See **Cleaning** on **Page 18**).

- **3.** Put on safety glasses, face shield, and respirator, then connect machine to power.
- Stand to side of buffer wheel and turn machine *ON*. Allow buffer wheel to reach full speed.




Figure 9. Applying buffing compound to wheel.

5. Apply buffing compound to rotating face of wheel, as shown in **Figures 9–10**. Only hold compound to wheel for 2–5 seconds. The buffer is now ready for buffing/polishing.




Figure 10. Location where buffing compound should contact wheel.

6. Turn machine *OFF* when completed.




Figure 11. Buffing compound set.



SECTION 6: MAINTENANCE



AWARNING

To reduce risk of shock or accidental startup, always disconnect machine from power before adjustments, maintenance, or service.

Schedule

For optimum performance from this machine, this maintenance schedule must be strictly followed.

Ongoing

To maintain a low risk of injury and proper machine operation, if you ever observe any of the items below, shut down the machine immediately and fix the problem before continuing operations:

- · Loose bolts on shafts or mounted base.
- Damaged shafts.
- Damaged buffing wheels.
- Worn or damaged wires.
- Any other unsafe condition.

Weekly Maintenance

- Worn or damaged shaft bearings.
- Worn or damaged cord.
- Worn ON/OFF switch.

Monthly Check

Clean/vacuum dust buildup off motor.

Cleaning

Cleaning the Model G1061/G1061Z buffing system is relatively easy. Vacuum excess wood chips, sawdust, or metal shavings and wipe off the remaining dust with a dry cloth. Wipe down shafts with a non-staining lubricant after cleaning.

To clean buffing wheels, use a buffing wheel rake to remove dried compound. Guide the rake across the spinning buffing wheel using light pressure, as shown in **Figure 14**.

Lubrication

The bearings inside the Model G1061/1061Z are sealed and permanently lubricated. Simply leave them alone unless they need replacing.

SECTION 8: WIRING

CAPACITORS/INVERTERS. Some capacitors and power inverters store an electrical charge for up to 10 minutes after being disconnected from the power source. To reduce the risk of being shocked, wait at least this long before working on capacitors.






Figure 15. Buffing system wiring.


