Smokeless Fire Pit Safety Sheet

Product Overview: A smokeless fire pit is designed to reduce the amount of smoke produced while burning wood or other fuel. It uses a unique airflow system that promotes more complete combustion, making it ideal for outdoor settings.

Safety Guidelines:

1. Location:

- Place the fire pit on a flat, stable surface, preferably non-combustible, such as concrete, stone, or gravel.
- Maintain a safe distance from flammable materials, including buildings, trees, and overhanging branches. A minimum of 10 feet clearance is recommended.

2. Ventilation:

- Always use the fire pit outdoors in a well-ventilated area. Never use it indoors or in enclosed spaces like tents, garages, or RVs.
- Ensure there is enough airflow around the fire pit to prevent the buildup of harmful gases.

3. Fuel:

- Use only dry, seasoned hardwoods for best results. Avoid using softwoods, green wood, or treated wood, as they can produce excessive smoke or harmful fumes.
- Do not use accelerants like gasoline, kerosene, or lighter fluid to start or maintain the fire.

4. Operation:

- Start with small pieces of wood to build up the fire gradually. Add larger logs once the fire is well-established.

- Never overload the fire pit with wood. Keep the fire at a manageable level to avoid excessive heat and uncontrolled flames.
- Use a fire pit screen or cover to contain sparks and embers.

5. Supervision:

- Never leave the fire pit unattended while in use. Ensure that an adult is always present to monitor the fire.
- Keep children and pets at a safe distance from the fire pit to prevent accidents.

6. Extinguishing the Fire:

- Allow the fire to burn down naturally until only ash remains. Extinguish the fire completely using water or sand. Stir the ash to ensure all embers are fully extinguished.
- Do not leave the fire pit until it is completely cool.

7. Cleaning and Maintenance:

- Regularly clean out ash and debris from the fire pit to maintain proper airflow and performance.
